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**Afonso Celso**

Afonso Celso de Assis Figueiredo Júnior (Ouro Preto, 1860-Rio de Janeiro, 1938), granted by Pope Pius X the title Conde de Afonso Celso in the Holy See, better known as Afonso Celso, was a Brazilian teacher, poet, historian and politician. He was one of the founders of the Brazilian Academy of Letters, where he occupied chair number 36, and was elected president in 1925 and 1935. Son of Afonso Celso, Visconde de Ouro Preto, the last President of the Council of Ministers of the Brazilian Empire, he was elected for four consecutive terms as deputy to the national parliament from Minas Gerais. With the proclamation of the republic, in 1889, he withdrew from politics to accompany his father in exile. Devoting himself to journalism and teaching, for more than 30 years he regularly contributed articles to the *Jornal do Brasil* and *Correio da Manhã*. He held the chair of political economy at the Faculdade de Ciências Jurídicas e Sociais do Rio de Janeiro. After the death of the Barão Rio Branco, in 1912, he was elected perpetual president of the Instituto Histórico e Geográfico Brasileiro, a post he held until 1938. Afonso Celso was great grandfather of the musician Dinho Ouro Preto, vocalist of the rock band Capital Inicial.

First separate edition of this play, or novel in dialogue form. It had appeared in a volume with two other works by the author titled *Notas e Ficções*, Rio de Janeiro: H. Garnier (1893?). The present volume contains an errata on the penultimate unnumbered

leaf recto, with a note by the author of 31 lines on the verso, dated 2 September 1896, which is presumably new to this edition.

## Alcindo Guanabara

Alcindo Guanabara (1865 -1918) was a Brazilian journalist and politician. Journalist from 1886, he was an articulate republican and abolitionist. He participated in the Constituinte of 1891 and was a federal deputy for Rio de Janeiro (1891–1893) and for the Distrito Federal (1894–1899 and 1906–1911), senator for the Distrito Federal (1912–1917) and Rio de Janeiro (1918). In 1906, he was the author of the Lei do Sorteio, which instituted obligatory military service.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION. Manuel Ferraz de Campos Sales (Campinas, São Paulo 1841-Santos, São Paulo, 1913) served as Brazil's fourth president, from 1898 to 1902. This work, published the year his tenure ended, discusses with approval his austere financial reforms.

## Tristão de Alencar Araripe Junior

Araripe Junior (Fortaleza, 1848-Rio de Janeiro, 1911) ranked as a literary critic with Sílvio Romero and José Veríssimo.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION. In this work the author discusses Machado de Assis, Sílvio Romero, José de Alencar, Ibsen, and an assortment of other novelists, poets, and short-story writers. Romero (critiquing the critic) described Araripe Junior's work as "psychological and impressionistic, at times paradoxical and metaphysical, at other

times obscure and excessively refined" (quoted in Bandeira, *Brief History of Brazilian Literature* p. 136).

## Artur Nabantino Gonçalves de Azevedo

Artur Nabantino Gonçalves de Azevedo (1855-1900) was a Realist, best known as a dramatist and writer of short stories. He participated in the "Battle of Parnassus," waged between the Romantics and Realists in the pages of the *Diario do Rio de Janeiro*, 1870. A native of São Luis, Maranhão, he was the brother of novelist Aluísio de Azevedo.

## Henrique Maximiano Coelho Netto

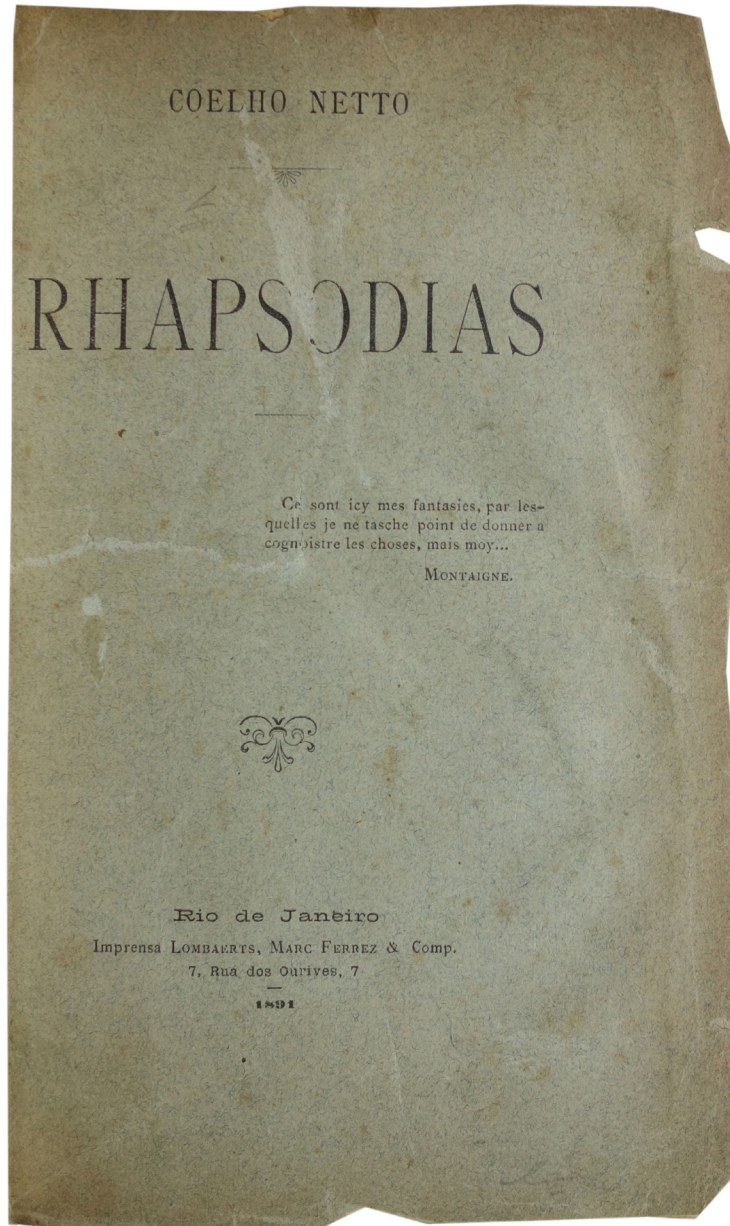
Henrique Macimiano Coelho Netto (1864-1934) was born in Caxias, Maranhão, to a Portuguese father and Indian mother. From his earliest years he was fascinated with native lore as well as the Portuguese and Latin classics; both had profound effects on his writings. He is difficult to classify, and has been called both a realist and a romanticist. Certainly he was one of the most vocal adversaries of the Modernist movement, and the Modernist authors responded by excluding his works from anthologies for many years. In the Academia Brasileira de Letras, however, he was held in such esteem that he was nominated for the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1933. To Machado de Assis he was "dos nossos primeiros romancistas, e geralmente falando, dos nossos primeiros escritores"; to Silvio Romero, he was one of the sixteen best Brazilian writers, and "o mais imaginoso de todos" (both quoted in Faria, pp. 126, 128).

Coelho Netto left an enormous oeuvre of over 120 volumes, including novels, plays, short stories, folktales, and political and historical essays. His works have been translated into French, English, German, Italian, Spanish, Swiss, Russian, Japanese, Danish and Esperanto.

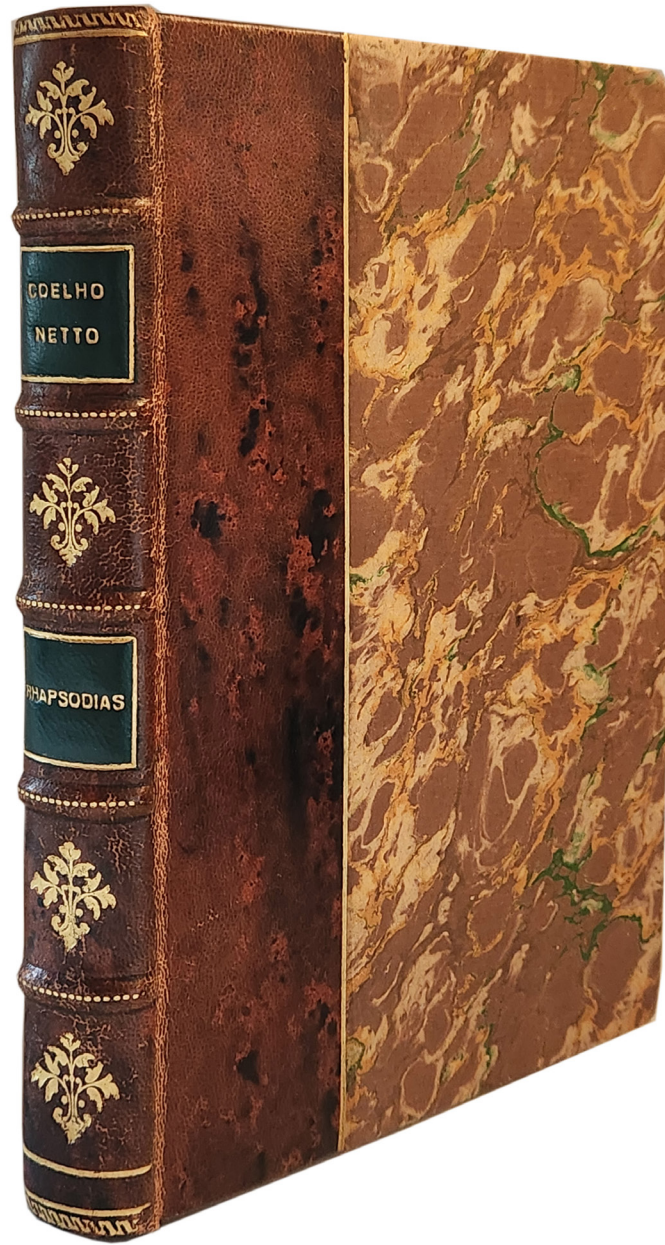

## Filinto de Almeida

Filinto de Almeida (1857-1945) was born in Porto but emigrated to Brazil at age 10. His first play was performed in 1876. He married the novelist Júlia Lopes de Almeida, with whom he collaborated on the novel *A casa verde*.

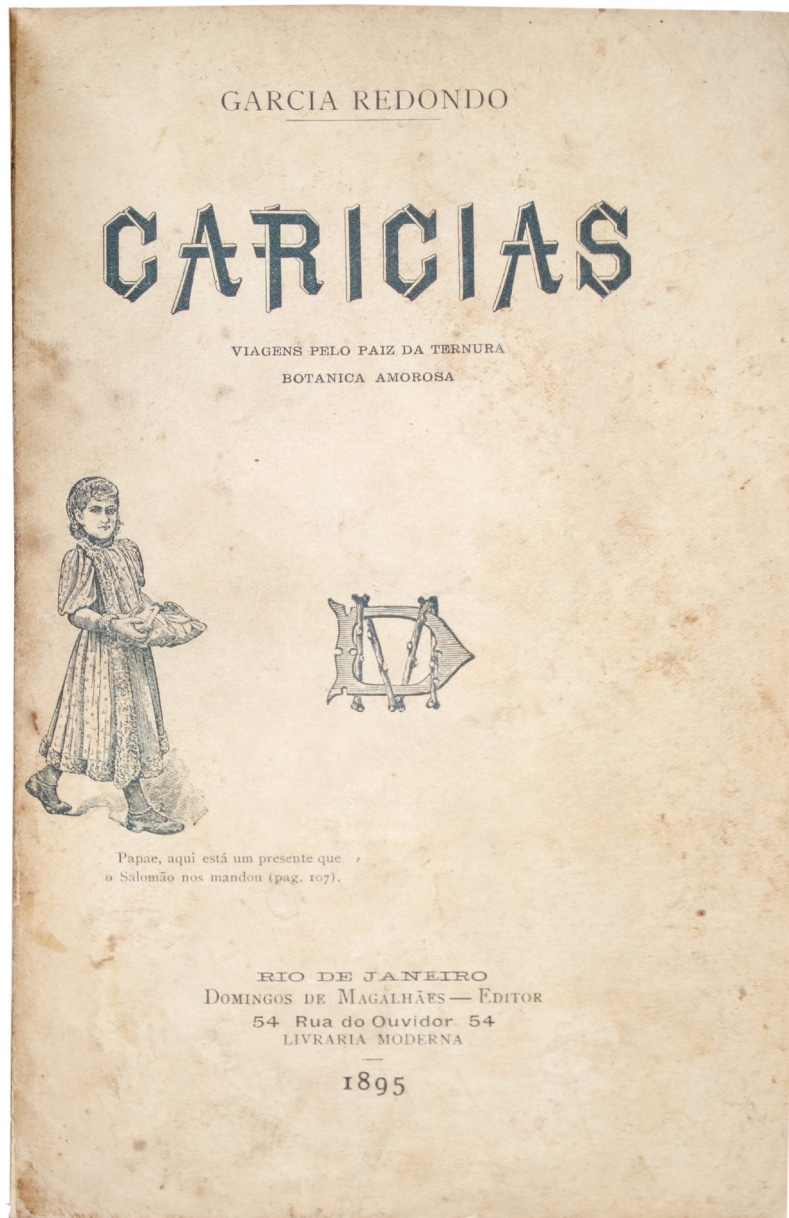
## Manuel Ferreira Garcia Redondo

Garcia Redondo (Rio de Janeiro, 1854-São Paulo, 1916), was an author, engineer, journalist, teacher and short-story writer. Later editions of this work appeared at Rio de Janeiro (1902 and 1936) and São Paulo (1911).

## João Manoel Pereira da Silva

Pereira da Silva (1817-1898), a native of Rio de Janeiro who studied in Paris, was an important historian as well as a politician, "outstanding in the fields of criticism and literary history" (Bandeira p. 99). He published numerous articles in major Brazilian periodicals, some of which (as here) were collected into books. Sacramento Blake praises him as "uma das pennas mais fecundas que o Brazil tem produzido, adquirindo para seu autor a mais alta e merecida reputação, tanto no paiz, como fóra d'elle.

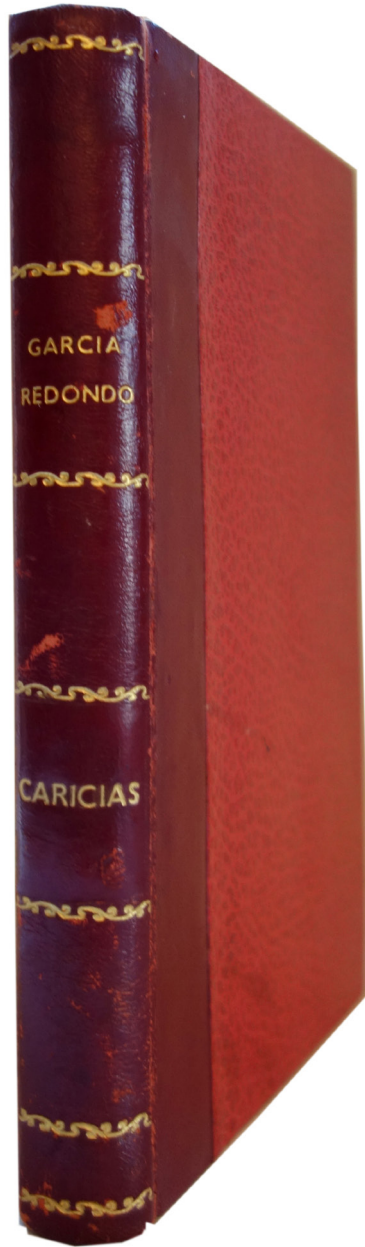

The first edition appeared in Rio de Janeiro, 1840 in the *Jornal do Commercio*; this is, according to the author's preface, the first separate edition, revised and corrected. Jerónimo Corte-Real (1533-1588) was an epic poet highly regarded in his own time; among his works are *O Segundo cerco de Diu*, 1574, and *Naufração de Sepulveda*, 1594.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION. Based on lectures about Portuguese and Brazilian nationality, language, and literature, given in Rio de Janeiro in 1880 before an audience that included the Emperor of Brazil.

## Joaquim Maria Machado de Assis.

Machado de Assis (1839-1908) has been described as the greatest mulatto novelist, Brazil's greatest writer, and the most original novelist to appear in the Western Hemisphere during the nineteenth century. He was born in Rio de Janeiro, son of a black housepainter and a Portuguese woman from the Azores. His intelligence and tenacity enabled him to achieve important positions in the government bureaucracy and, ultimately, presidency of the Brazilian Academy of Letters.

## Olavo Bilac

Olavo Bilac (1865-1918), a native of Rio de Janeiro, began but did not complete courses in medicine and law; instead he decided to devote himself to literature, and from his home in Rio de Janeiro began contributing extensively to periodicals. His first poems appeared in the *Gazeta Acadêmica* in 1883. His first published book was *Poesias 1884-1887*, São Paulo, 1888. Major works following the appearance of *Poesias* include *Crônicas e novelas* (1894), *Sagres* (1898), an expanded edition of *Poesias* (1902), and *Tarde*, published posthumously in 1919. In the last years of his life Bilac lectured throughout Brazil on national defense, specifically advocating compulsory military service.

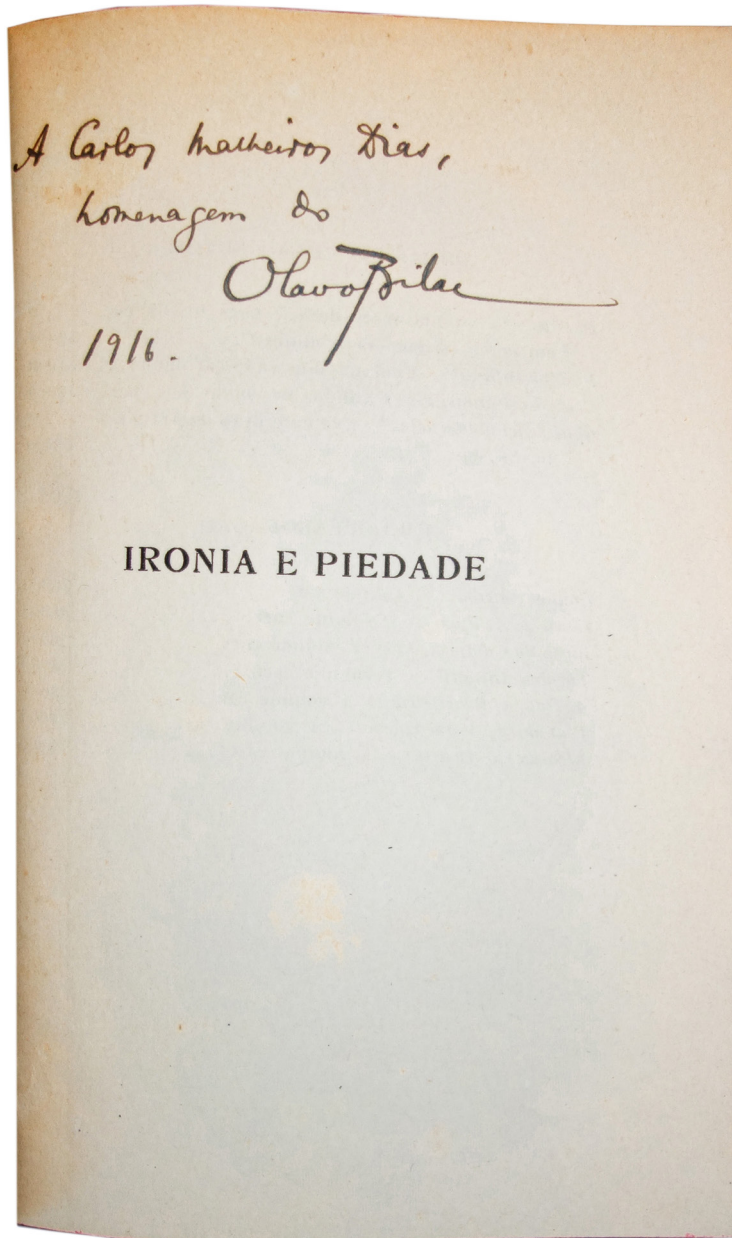

First Edition in Book Form of these 52 short essays, most of which appeared previously in the *Gazeta de notícias* of Rio de Janeiro. The second edition appeared in Rio, 1921, the third in Rio, 1926. Among the subjects of the essays are China, Jules Verne, Carnaval, the Boers, electricity, Erasmus, and graphology. On pages 175-8 is an essay on tuberculosis and public health.

Bilac, Raimundo Correia, Alberto de Oliveira, and Vicente de Carvalho were the four major poets of the Brazilian Parnassian school, which reacted against the excesses of Romanticism beginning in the 1870s. Of these four, the critics preferred Correia, but the public favored Bilac, and he was often referred to as the "Prince of Brazilian poets." In the years immediately following his death, before Modernism took hold, Bilac was the most widely read and imitated Brazilian poet, and even the Modernists, reacting in their turn against precisely the sort of things Bilac stood for, could not condemn his work completely. Jong wrote that "His impeccable poems are fluent, brilliant and full of passion.... But in spite of his meticulous workmanship, his poems always remain natural, simple and correct" (*400 Years*, p. 398).

This tenth edition is the first to contain the substantial contribution of Olivo Bilac, covering 1823 to 1905. The ninth edition (190-?) contained only 397 pages.

The work was begun by Joaquim Manoel de Macedo (1820-1882), a native of Itaboraí, Rio de Janeiro, who is usually considered the first Brazilian novelist. His *A Moreninha*, published in 1844, was a tremendous popular success and is still read today. Macedo had tremendous influence as a novelist, was an important force in Brazilian theater, and was one of the most prolific authors Brazil has ever produced. He taught history and geography at the Colégio Pedro II, and was tutor of Princess Isabel's children.

When he died he had completed this work only up to 1823. The editor asked Olavo Bilac, already a famous writer, to complete the *Lições*. Bilac wrote the sections covering 1823 to 1905 (pp. 345-513), attempting to match Macedo's tone.

## Manuel de Oliveira Lima

Manoel de Oliveira Lima (Recife, 1867–Washington, D.C., 1928) was a Brazilian writer, literary critic, diplomat, historian, and journalist. He represented Brazil in Portugal, Belgium, Germany, Japan, Venezuela, Great Britain and the United States, and was a visiting professor at Harvard University. Passionate book collector throughout his life, he assembled the third largest collection on Brazil, after those of the National Library of Brazil and to the library of the University of São Paulo. The Oliveira Lima Library, located at the Catholic University of America, Washington, US, has 58,000 books in addition to correspondence exchanged with intellectuals, more than six hundred paintings and countless albums of clippings with newspaper news.

## Ruy Barbosa

Ruy Barbosa de Oliveira (Bahia, 1849-Petrópolis, 1923), also known as Rui Barbosa, was a Brazilian politician, writer, jurist, and diplomat. A prominent defender of civil liberties, he called for the abolition of slavery in Brazil. Barbosa represented Brazil in the second Hague convention, argued for Brazil's participation in World War I on the side of the Allies, and personally ordered the destruction of all government records pertaining to slavery while Minister of Finance (15 November 1889-21 January 1891). Defeated presidential candidate in 1910, 1914 and 1919, Barbosa's liberal ideas were influential in drafting of the first republican constitution.

## Sílvia Roméro

Sílvia [Vasconcelos da Silveira Ramos] Romero (Lagarto, Sergipe, 1851-1914), was "one of the most able and productive literary historians Brazil has had" (Jong, p. 326): his *História da litteratura brasileira* has long been one of the standard histories of the subject. Romero also wrote extensively on sociology, ethnography and politics. Goldberg describes Romero as "one of the most picturesque figures of the nineteenth century. He was a born fighter, with all the traits of the ardent polemicist. Throughout a lifetime that was rife with self-contradiction, he fought for Brazilian independence in the literary, scientific and political fields" (p. 295).

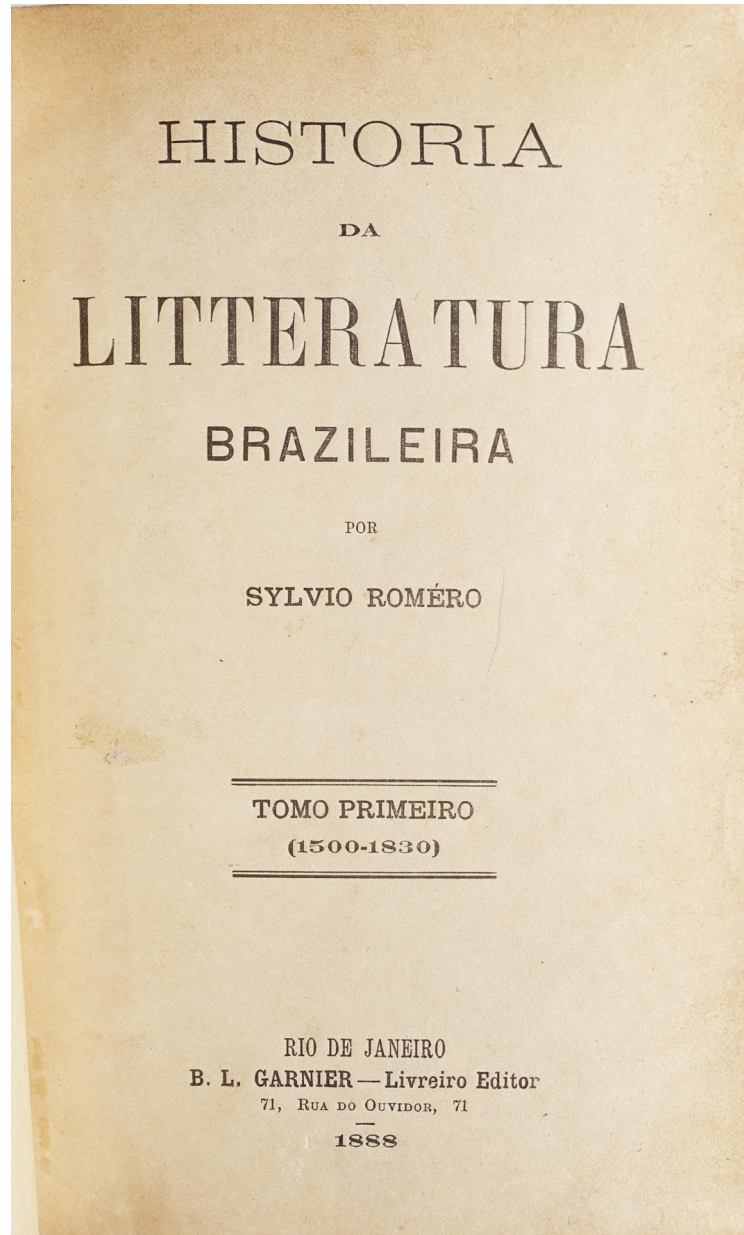

## Visconde de Taunay

Alfredo Maria Adriano d'Escragnoille Taunay, primeiro e único Visconde de Taunay (1843-1899), was a native of Rio de Janeiro. Historian, lexicographer and political figure, he was also one of the foremost Brazilian novelists of the later nineteenth century, as well as a distinguished politician. His literary works—most written under pseudonyms such as Sílvio Dinarte—include the novels *Inocência* (1872) and *O encilhamento* (1893). *Inocência*, set in the sertão of Matto Grosso, was one of the first Brazilian novels to forsake Romanticism for Realism.

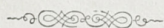
