



First edition of this adaptation. Prince Adalbert's *Aus meinem Tagebuche*, was printed for private distribution only; Kletke rewrote the Prince's first-person diary as a third-person narrative and offered it commercially. The frontispiece shows the Prince in full military regalia.

Prince Adalbert and his suite arrived in Rio de Janeiro in 1842. From there they made several excursions, to Nova Friburgo, Macaé, Campos, etc. Next they sailed to Pará, from there up the Amazon to the Xingu, and up the Xingu to a point never before visited by Europeans. Upon their return to Pará the Prince and his entourage made excursions into Maranhão, Recife and Bahia. The Brazilian section of the book covers pp. 207-749. Preceding it is a description of the Prince's journeys to Aetna, the Alhambra, Gibraltar, Cádiz, Madeira and Tenerife, with substantial chapters on each.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION of this fictional account of a servant who accompanies his master to Australia. Aguiar chose Australia as the scene for his moralizing tale in hopes that the new nation would be a haven from the vices of the Old World. This work departs from the tradition of More and Swift, presenting a utopia based on social conservatism, and an exploration of the plurality of worlds within the framework of Christian faith. Aguiar notes that he has no knowledge of Australia and doesn't wish to fool his readers into thinking he had been there, but he does include a fulsome description of the social life of Sydney and the beauty of Australia in his section on the Valley of Reason.

The author (d. 1855) was an official in the Conselho de Saúde Pública.





FIRST in book form of this valuable compendium of information on Ilha Terceira. A second edition appeared in 2019. The several dozen short articles, arranged in alphabetical order, include histories of the various religious and secular institutions; historical and descriptive notes on notable churches, buildings, cemeteries (including a Jewish cemetery), public areas and monuments; descriptions of religious and secular festivals; a list of foreign consuls then in residence; notes on libraries and printing establishments; biographies of some native Azorians who held titles of nobility; and accounts of royal visits to the Azores.

Costa Junior (1817-1887), a native of Angra, was a member of the Junta Geral for his district and also a provisional counsel. He owned and edited the journal *Insulano*, in which these articles first appeared, and published several other historical and biographical works.

FIRST EDITION of this comprehensive survey, island by island, of the natural history of the Azores. It includes information on whales. A second edition appeared in Lisbon, 1871.

The author was a surgeon, graduate of the Lisbon Medical School, journalist and a native of Angra do Heroismo (1834-Lisbon, 1892). He became a high ranking military surgeon, and was a corresponding member of the Academia Real das Sciencias de Lisboa as well as other scientific entities both Portuguese and foreign. As a journalist he favored liberal causes, even suffering some political persecution, to the extent of being imprisoned for a time in the Castelo São Jorge.


FIRST EDITION, unanimously described as very rare. This is the standard history of the reign of King John III of Portugal (1521-1557), the "strong-willed and weak-minded ascetic," ranked by Figueiredo as one of the five best classical works in Portuguese. Like all Renaissance chronicles of Portugal, the history dwells extensively on the recent Portuguese conquests in the East and in Brazil, leaving relatively little space for the internal events of the kingdom. The Inquisition discouraged any emphasis on home affairs, especially in vernacular works such as this.

Of the 413 chapters in the book, at least 291 deal partly or completely with Portuguese activities in the East, at Goa, Diu, Chaul, and Calicut in India, Ternate and Malacca, Ceylon, and China. An additional 46 chapters are concerned with Africa and the Mideast, e.g., Mozambique, Zanzibar, Ethiopia, Ormuz, Suez, Alcacer Cequer, Tangiers, Ceuta and Arzila. There is also one chapter (IV, 32) on the foundation of Salvador in Brazil; as the author says in the introduction to this chapter, the King and his Council paid less attention to that area at the time, "avendoas por menos importantes, porque os proveitos dellas se esperavão mais da grangearia da terra, que do comercio da gente"

Francisco de Andrade (ca. 1535-1614), brother of the great mystic writer Frei Thomé de Jesus, wrote this chronicle and was the author of the celebrated epic poem on the first siege of Diu, *O primeiro cerco ...de Diu*, which he regarded as a supplementary chapter to this history. Andrade was a Commander of the Order of Christ, a member of the State Council, Chief Keeper of the Archives and Chief Chronicler of the Kingdom.

Although the Azevedo catalogue and Borba call for 20 preliminary leaves, a close inspection of copies at the Biblioteca Nacional of Lisbon, British Library, Harvard (Palha copy), and Florida indicates that 19 preliminary leaves is the norm. Copies also exist at the Newberry Library and New York Public Library which are missing several leaves, but whose preliminary leaves appear to conform to those in our copy.

Provenance: D. Luis Francisco de Benavides Carrillo de Toledo (1608-1668), was born in Valencia, member of a noble Spanish family. He made a career in the army during the many battles in Italy and Flanders between 1629 and 1659, conquering the fortress of Casale Monferrato in 1652. Governor of Milan between 1648 and 1656, after the defeat of John of Austria the Younger in the Battle of the Dunes (1658), Caracena was appointed to succeed him. After the conclusion of the Treaty of the Pyrenees, the Habsburg Netherlands saw a period of relative peace, but governing wasn't easy, since by then various wars had pushed Spain to the brink of bankruptcy. Assuming command of Spanish forces against Portugal, he suffered defeat at the Battle of Montes Claros, effectively ending the War

of Restoration in favor of the Portuguese. After the battle, Caracena was charged with treason and cowardice. He claimed the defeat was due to the poor state of the Spanish army, intrigue in the Spanish Court, and lack of funds. 

FIRST EDITION, rare. Written in the form of 100 *cartas*, or chapters, this correspondence from husband to wife discusses the history, customs, and present state of India (especially Calcutta), Macao, and China, based on the author's travels there and on his wide-ranging reading. Particular emphasis is given to the history of Portuguese discoveries, settlement and trade in the Far East, Chinese dynastic history, Chinese social life, culture, and institutions, tea, and Portugal's long rivalry with England in Asian commerce and colonial affairs. The lithograph plates include portraits of Chinese emperors and some of Andrade's Chinese friends, and portraits of the author and his wife after works by the noted Portuguese painter Domingos António de Sequeira (1768-1837). The *Cartas* opens and closes with two commendatory poems by Andrade's friend Francisco Antonio Martins Bastos, sometime poet, professor of Latin, and translator of much Latin poetry into Portuguese.

José Ignacio de Andrade, born on the Island of Sancta Maria in the Azores in 1780, devoted his life to overseas commerce, making numerous voyages to India and China. After many years he became a director of the Bank of Portugal and the Bank of Lisbon. This first edition was distributed only to his friends, and is rare. A second, fairly common

edition, also with 12 lithograph portraits and with many corrections and additions, came from the same press in 1847 and is as elegant as the first.

FIRST (and only?) EDITION of this anthropological work with autobiographical overtones, one of the author's earliest books. While various dates of publication are given, our guess is that all refer to the same edition. Maria Archer spent her childhood and young adult years in Moçambique (1910-1913 and 1921-1926), Guiné (1916-1918), and Angola (1930-1934). Her writing is marked by the courage with which she depicts women at a time when to do so was not politically correct. She was a fierce opponent of the Salazar regime, spending 1954-1974 in forced exile in Brazil, returning to Portugal in 1977 to die five years later, ignored and in misery.

Provenance: Acúrcio Pereira (1891-1977) was considered the dean of Portuguese journalists; he wrote for practically every daily newspaper published in Lisbon and Porto during the 1930s, 40s, and 50s, as well as for literary reviews and magazines. In 1911 he joined the *Diário de notícias,* then headed by Alfredo da Cunha, rising rapidly from reporter to important editorial positions and serving 27 years as editor-in-chief. First edition thus. By the end of the nineteenth century, D'Aulnoy's account, originally published in 1691, had gone through a dozen editions in French, 16 in English, 5 in German, and one each in Dutch and Spanish. In the English translation of 1692, the full title is *The Ingenious and Diverting Letters of the Lady* ____[sic] *Travels into Spain, describing the devotions, nunneries, humours, customs, laws, militia, trade, diet, and recreations of that people, intermixt with great variety of modern adventures, and surprising accidents; being the truest and best remarks extant on that court and country.*

The great French Hispanist Foulché-Delbosc provides a long and very learned introduction (appearing for the first time in this edition) in which he demonstrates that

the work in question is entirely fictional, or "at least embroidered", and heavily reliant on other sources. Marie-Catherine Le Jumel de Barneville, Baroness (or Countess) d'Aulnoy (1651-1705), was an excellent writer and an interesting character, known primarily for fairy tales (*contes de fées*) such as *Goldilocks* and the *Blue Bird*.

First Edition in Portuguese of the author's *Reise durch Nord-Brasilien im Jahre 1859*, 2 volumes 1859-1860. The first volume accounts for his travels and scientific findings in the provinces of Bahia, Pernambuco, Alagoas and Sergipe. The second volume deals with his experiences on the Amazon River, from Pará to Manaus, and up the Rio Negro as well as Rio Solimões, and back to Pará. He traveled to and from Pará via Pernambuco, Paraíba do Norte, Rio Grande do Norte, Ceará and Maranhão, returning to Pernambuco after a side trip to the Rio Madeira.

Robert Christian Barthold Avé-Lallemant (Lübeck, 1812-Lübeck, 1884) was a German physician and explorer. He was a brother to criminologist Friedrich Christian Benedict Avé-Lallemant (1809–1892) and music critic Theodor Avé-Lallemant (1806–1890). He earned his medical degree from the University of Kiel, and in 1836 relocated to Brazil, where he became director of a sanatorium for yellow fever patients in Rio de Janeiro. In 1855 he returned to Germany, and enlisted as ship's doctor for the Austrian *Novara* expedition with a special recommendation from Alexander von Humboldt. After the SMS *Novara* had crossed the Atlantic Ocean to South America in 1857, Avé-Lallemant disembarked in Rio de Janeiro, leaving the expedition. Here he found work as a physician at the Fremdenhospital, but soon afterwards began scientific exploration of the country's interior. During his second time in Brazil. he spent approximately two years performing extensive exploration of the country, supported by the Emperor D. Pedro II.

FIRST EDITION. Following the coup d'état on 18 Fructidor 1797, Aymé and many other deputies to the French legislature were deported to French Guiana—later site of the notorious penal colony that included Devil's Island, where Alfred Dreyfus was incarcerated. In this work Aymé (1752-1818) tells of the coup and recounts in detail the horrendous conditions in French Guiana. Pages 174-88 are devoted to a description of the blacks there, including their religious beliefs, their attitude toward white men, and their behavior following the abolition of slavery in Cayenne. The unnumbered leaves at the end contain a table of those deported from France with Aymé on *La Vaillante*, with their professions, ages and fates on the trip. Mortality rates were appallingly high.

In 1799, Aymé managed to escape on the American vessel *Gothenburg*, but was shipwrecked off the Scottish coast. When he made his way back to France, Napoleon appointed him to *Directeur des droits réunis du départ* for Gers.

An English translation was published in London, 1800: Narrative of the Deportation to Cayenne and Shipwreck on the Coast of Scotland.

FIRST EDITION. Macaulay called this work "one of the best accounts of the civil war; unlike the British officers in Dom Pedro's service, he had no personal grievances to embitter his style" (*They Went to Portugal* p. 330). It is well written, with a wealth of concrete detail about conditions in Portugal and Spain at that time. Badcock (1786-1861), who had served earlier in Montevideo, then in Spain and Portugal during the Peninsular Wars, was sent to Portugal as part of an English military mission dispatched to study the situation in Portugal at the beginning of the civil war between D. Pedro and D. Miguel. One of Badcock's duties was to learn the movements of Spanish troops on the Portuguese frontier and to determine, if possible, the intentions of the Spanish. His description of his travels in Spain covers pp. 19-131; most of the rest of the volume gives a detailed eyewitness account of the siege of Porto. In 1840 he assumed the surname Lovell; the DNB lists him under Lovell, Sir Benjamin Lovell Badcock. Eventually he attained the rank of Major General.

Jean Barbot was a commercial agent on French slave-trading voyages in 1678-79 and 1681-82. He began an account of the Guinea coast based on his own observations and on printed sources. The account was expanded for an English edition and continually revised to his death in 1712. This translation includes material from the French and English editions, focusing on Barbot's eyewitness information.

James Anderson and James Stewart, veteran employees of the Hudson's Bay Company, set out in June 1855 to track down rumors that Inuits near Pelly Bay had seen the Franklin expedition to the Arctic, which had vanished in 1845. Anderson and Stewart confirmed that the Inuit had articles which could only have come from Franklin's ship, but were forced by the lateness of the season to return to Fort Resolution before they could reach King William Island, where they learned Franklin's expedition had come to grief.

In the summer of 1742 Christopher Middleton sailed farther north in Hudson Bay than any previous European, but failed to find a Northwest Passage. He was accused of negligence and corruption, generating a mass of pamphlets and manuscripts which are presented here, along with Middleton's own journal. William Moor and Francis Smith were sent four years later on a privately financed expedition to seek the Passage; the second volume presents a multitude of different accounts of and reactions to that expedition.

Ricardo Augusto Pereira Guimarães (Porto, 1830-Lisbon, 1889), writer, journalist, and politician, fought for the liberals in Porto as a young man before studying law at

Coimbra. With Camilo Castelo Branco, he was one of the founders of *O Portuense*. After serving in the Cortes and writing for several periodicals, he was appointed secretary-general of Macau in 1868. Although he returned halfway through his journey to take up his post, due to ill health, the two books he wrote based on it are among his best: *De Lisboa ao Cairo* and *Na Itália*, both published in 1876. Around 1871, he dropped out of politics and devoted himself to writing. He was named first Visconde de Benalcanfor by D. Luis I in 1870 and assumed a seat in the Câmara Alta as a peer of the realm in 1887. He was a member of more than a few learned societies, including the Academia Real das Ciências de Lisboa and the Academia Real da História.





Second edition of a work first published Paris, 1843. The brutal suppression by the Turks of a Christian insurrection in Bulgaria in 1841 attracted wide notice in France, and Blanqui was charged by the French government to undertake a fact-finding mission. During August and September 1841 Blanqui travelled the length of Bulgaria, from Belgrade to Sofia and then on to Adrianopolis and Constantinople, before returning to France. In addition to lengthy discussions of the insurrection and its causes, the Christian and Muslim religions, and future prospects for Christianity in Bulgaria, Blanqui records his observations of the present social, economic and political states of Serbia, Bulgaria and Turkey.

Blanqui (1798-1854) was born at Nice and, while a schoolmaster in Paris, became a protégé of the noted economist Jean Baptiste Say. In 1833 he succeeded Say in the chair of political economy at the Conservatoire des Arts et Métiers. Blanqui travelled widely to collect information for his important *Histoire de l'economie politique en Europe* (Paris, 1838) and other works.

Jean Bernard Bossu (1720-1792), a captain in the French navy, was the first to write about eighteenth-century Louisiana in detail and based on personal experience. He provided the French public with the earliest trustworthy description of the people and



conditions in the colony. The work is actually a collection of 21 letters he wrote during his first two voyages to the country, in 1751-57 and 1757-62. Bossu traveled as far north as Fort de Chartres, just south of Saint Louis. He spent time with the Natchez, Arkansas, Koakias (Cherokees?), Alabama, Choctaw, Illinois and Atakapa tribes, providing substantial information on their habits in religion, warfare, social customs (e.g., punishment for adultery), hunting, and more. He also comments on Santo Domingo, mining, syphilis, Havana, New Orleans, Hernando de Soto, El Dorado, the Sieur de La Salle, Granada, Jamaica, Lake Ponchartrain, Mobile, and the Fountain of Youth. Occasionally he ranges even further afield, describing the skeletons of elephants (i.e., mastodons) found in the Ohio Valley in 1735 (p. 206). At second hand, he reports on events in Canada such as the capture by Montcalm of Fort Oswego, Fort Ontario and New Fort Oswego in 1756. In Book II, Lettre XXI, Bossu speculates that the Indians reached America via a land bridge from Tartary, referring to the works of Diodorus Siculus, Peter Martyr, Lafitau, Lescarbot, and Bering. In the course of his travels Bossu was shipwrecked, had a close escape from a crocodile, and ran afoul of English corsairs several times.

The four engravings by Gabriel de Saint Aubin all show Indians; among them are a gruesome decapitation and an Indian who stands on an overturned chest full of coins.

The first edition of this work is distinguished from the second edition, with the same imprint and date, by its lack of the words "second edition" on the title. Howes notes, "For comments too critical of the ministry, Bossu was imprisoned and his book banned for awhile in France; this probably accounts for the scarcity of the first edition, of which Sabin found no record." The *Nouveaux voyages* was soon translated to English, Dutch, German, and Russian.



This is volume III of New Voyages and Travels, consisting of extracts from Brackenridge's two-volume work, Voyage to South America, performed by order of the American government, in the years 1817 and 1818, in the frigate Congress, Baltimore, 1819. The Advertisement (p. iii) states, "[Brackenridge] has presented to the world two luminous volumes on the subject of South America, in which many valuable disquisitions, historical and political, have been mixed with his personal adventures and local observations,—but, in the pages which follow, the former have been rejected, and only the latter preserved." It includes chapters on Rio de Janeiro and Brazil; São Paulo, Santa Catarina, and Rio Grande; Montevideo and Buenos Aires (with an interview with the Supreme Director and other high officials); Chile; principal events in Buenos Aires since 1806; and Venezuela and New Granada.

Henry Marie Brackenridge (1786-1871), a native of Pittsburgh, was admitted to the Pennsylvania bar in 1806, and set off with Manuel Lisa on a trip up the Missouri in 1811, then sailed to New Orleans, where he took up residence as a district judge and published *Views of Louisiana*, 1814. When the former colonies in South America were declaring their independence, Brackenridge published *South America, a Letter on the Present State of that Country*, which was sent to James Monroe. Six years later Monroe incorporated many of its ideas into the Monroe Doctrine. Meanwhile, Brackenridge was chosen part of a commission to sail on the frigate *Congress* to observe firsthand the situation in Rio de Janeiro, Montevideo, Buenos Aires, and Chile.



Among the details are brief descriptions of the landmarks that the ambassador was taken to visit and an account of his meeting with D. João IV, who seems to have been dripping with diamonds (f. A4r). Some of the speeches are transcribed, and at the end of the volume are two sonnets about the ambassador's presentation to the king and queen.

King Louis XIII of France had signed a treaty of alliance with Portugal on June 1, 1641; the beginning of this pamphlet notes that Louis XIV was eager to continue it. The alliance was part of the diplomatic maneuvering involved in the Thirty Years' War, which began as a war between Catholics and Protestants, but widened into a battle between the Bourbons and Habsburgs: hence the French at this time supported rebellions in Catalonia and in Portugal. The Thirty Years' War significantly affected the outcome of the Portuguese struggle for independence (the Restauração), since it prevented the King of Spain from directing his full military might against Portugal.

In 2009, after a public appeal, the British Library purchased a manuscript 'Booke', which Captain Narbrough bought in 1666 and into which he subsequently entered his journals of his voyages and correspondence relating to them. The 'Booke' contains his own fair copy of the journal of his voyage through the Strait of Magellan and north to Valdivia in the Sweepstakes, 1669-1671. This is published here for the first time, together with an incomplete and somewhat different copy of the journal, held in the Bodleian Library, which was made for him by a clerk after he returned to England, and which was partially published in 1694. Both versions of the journal together with previously unpublished records made by members of his company, as well as reproductions of the charts which Narbrough relied on and those he produced, are printed here. Narbrough's mission was to carry out a passenger who referred to himself as Don Carlos Enriques and who claimed to have expert knowledge of Peru and Chile, and contacts with disaffected colonists and indigenous peoples. Don Carlos's written proposals to King Charles II and his ministers, only recently discovered, are here translated from Spanish, and give a clear sense of the character, if not the real identity, of an adventurer, who gave the authorities in England, Chile and Peru totally different and changing stories about his status and the purpose of the voyage.

The Kleine Kinderbibliothek runs to 12 volumes (of which this is the fourth), but each can also be considered a separate work, and each was apparently reprinted as necessary. Joachim Heinrich Campe (1746-1818), a native of Lower Saxony, was a major figure in the German Enlightenment and is notable for his attempts at educational reform. He was briefly a tutor to Alexander and Wilhelm von Humboldt, with whom he maintained ties. After a brief stint as teacher at Johann Bernhard Basedow's Philanthropinum in Dessau, he established in Hamburg his own teaching institute, which based learning on a family model. Published works include *Robinson der Jüngere*, 1779-80, and the trilogy *Die Entdeckung von Amerika*. In 1786 he moved to Braunschweig, where he proposed to reform the school system. He died there in 1818, at age 72.

The *Voyage* first appeared in 1663, and was still being reprinted a century later. Poems of Jacques de Cailly (Chevalier d'Aceuilly (1604-1673) are added, starting on p. 79, where a note advises the reader that they were first published in 1667. Subjects include Colbert, Voltaire, Carré, ambition, the death of an old poet, curtains, and etymologies.

Claude-Emmanuel Lhuillier, called Chapelle (near Monmartre, 1626-Paris, 1686), French poet, studied with the Jesuits at La Flèche; his classmates included Descartes and Des Barreaux. He studied philosophy with Pierre Gassendi and was friends with Molière, Cyrano de Bergerac, La Fontaine, Racine, and Boileau, and frequented the salon of Marguerite de la Sablière. An Epicurean and a libertine, he wrote light-hearted, often satirical poems, the most successful of which were composed during a trip to Provence and Languedoc in 1656 with his friend François Le Coigneux de Bachaumont (1624-1702). The collection of poetry and prose was published in 1663 as *Voyage curieux historique et galant, montrant plusieurs particularitez très considérables, ce qu'il y a de plus beau et de plus remarquable à voir au tour de la France, et autres traitez de galanterie, meslés de prose et de vers, par les plus beaux esprits de ce temps.*

The author, son of the Consul General at Tangiers, was born there in 1831 and later held the same post as his father, as well as the post of Consul of Brazil in Morocco. He died in Tangiers, 1907. 

FIRST EDITION of one of the most important epic poems in the Portuguese language, generally acknowledged to be second only to the *Lusiadas* of Camões. Contemporaries of the two poets were far from unanimous in ranking Camões above Corte Real.

The poem's subject is one of the most celebrated events in Portuguese history: the shipwreck of the *São João* off the coast of Natal in 1552, which was followed by a trek through the wilderness of southeast Africa. The *Naufragio* was and continues to be by far the most popular of several peculiarly Portuguese contemporary accounts of maritime disasters, later collected under the title *Historia tragico-maritima*. This tragic, romantic drama is simply told, yet omits none of the more tawdry aspects of the journey. It is also of crucial importance as a source for the ethno-history of the tribes of southeastern

Africa, giving a wealth of information concerning the Bantu and the Hottentots prior to their extensive contacts with Europeans.

Corte Real was perhaps born in the Azores in 1533. He was not only a poet but a painter, and possibly also a musician; he may have accompanied D. Sebastião to Alcácer Kebir and been captured there. The *Naufragio* and his other major work, *Sucesso do segundo cerco de Diu*, 1574, were written after he retired to an estate near Évora. He died sometime before May 12, 1590.

In the spring of 1922 two of Portugal's most noted aviators, Sacadura Cabral and Gago Coutinho, made the first flight from Europe to South America, flying from Lisbon to Rio de Janeiro via the Canaries and Cabo Verde. It was the first long distance flight in which rigorous methods of aerial navigation were used, and Gago Coutinho contributed a lengthy section to this *Relatorio* describing his methods (pp. 45-62). Sacadura Cabral describes the selection and construction of the airplane, preparations for the journey and its stages. It is illustrated with photographs taken in the course of the trip.

First edition thus: Chapters 1-13 form "one of the basic sources for the earliest history of the New World" (Servies 12). It includes details on the kingdom of Nicaragua; the religious and marriage rites of the Indians; the region's lakes; Masaya and other volcanoes; mineral wealth (sulfur, alum); the relation of Fr. Blas del Castillo, a Dominican, on Masaya, followed by Oviedo's thoughts on it; and an account of the author's visit to the cacique of Tezoatega in 1523.

The first edition of *La historia general de las Indias* (Seville, 1535) included the first part (Books 1-19) and portions of Book 50. Oviedo himself said that the first part was translated into Italian, French, German, Latin, Greek, Turkish, and Arabic. The first complete edition of all three parts of the work (in 50 books) appeared in Madrid, 1851-1855.

Gonzalo Fernández de Oviedo y Valdéz (Madrid 1478-Valladolid, 1557) participated in the Spanish colonization of the Caribbean; his chronicle is one of the few surviving primary sources about it (although it was denounced by Fr. Bartolomé de las Casas). A nobleman educated at the court of Ferdinand and Isabella, he was a page and a courtier before being appointed supervisor of gold smelting at Santo Domingo in 1514. When he returned to Spain in 1523, he became historiographer of the Indies. Before his death, he visited the Americas five more times.

Henri Ternaux-Compans (Paris 1807-Paris, 1864) was the first major collector of Americana. Scion of a wealthy French merchant family, he devoted several years to traveling through Spain and South America, collecting materials for a 20-volume series of works concerning the discovery and early history of South America that began to appear in 1836. For this volume he provided a brief biography and bibliography of Oviedo (pp. [vii]-xv).



FIRST EDITION. A rare example of a work in Portuguese printed in Vienna; the printer apologizes for any errors that slipped into the text, "mais de ignorancia que da incuria" (final page). An abridged version of this work was published in 1787 under the title *Relação verdadeira da jornada que desde Lisboa fez a corte de Vienna d'Austria o Conde de Villar-Maior ….*

The author accompanied the Conde de Villar-Maior, Fernando Telles da Silva, to Vienna in 1708 to complete arrangements for the marriage of D. João V to D. Maria Anna of Austria, and to escort D. Maria Anna back to Lisbon. Telles da Silva's party travelled to London, then to Rotterdam, the Hague and Vienna. Fonseca gives descriptions of the United Provinces, England, Germany and the Court of Vienna, and also of such events as the celebrations at Vienna when Telles da Silva made his ceremonial entry.

The work is dedicated to D. João Gomes da Sylva, Conde de Tarouca.

Fonseca was born at Évora in 1668 and became a Jesuit in 1686. He studied humanities at Funchal before accompanying Telles da Silva as his confessor. After this trip, Fonseca travelled to Rome with P. Alvaro Cienfuegos, later a cardinal, and while there served as Procurador Geral das Missões do Oriente. He died in Rome in 1738. José Silvestre Ribeiro, quoted in Innocêncio, describes Fonseca as "um escriptor muito engraçado e escrupulosamente justiceiro."

Each of the profusely illustrated volumes in this series is a concise treatment of the history, topography, architectural, artistic and archeological points of interest of a specific municipality. They are especially useful as guides to the artistic and architectural inventories of the city or town.

José-Augusto [Rodrigues] França (Tomar, 1922-Jarzé-Villages, 2021) was one of Portugal's most distinguished art and cultural historians, as well as an important critic, literary figure, and intellectual. He was a leader in the introduction of surrealism to Portugal. After a long absence, he returned to writing fiction; between 2002 and 2010 he produced eight new novels or novellas and three collections of stories.

Figueira da Foz, which dates back at least to the eleventh century, is in the district of Coimbra at the mouth of the Mondego. When this congress was held there it was a popular seaside resort, but Lino sings the praises of the city's other attractions, from the Palácio Sotto-Maior to the bacalhau-drying in Murraceira. Most of the unnumbered leaves at the end are advertisements from local businesses.

FIRST EDITION. There exists a reprint, São Miguel: Câmara Municipal de Povoação, 1990. Records an expedition to S. Miguel's famous Valle das Furnas to study the natural phenomena (including geysers); with historical, geographical and scientific commentary. The text is nicely complemented by 3 dramatic illustrations of steaming *caldeiras*. The author traces the history of the Azores from the sixteenth century and describes the hot volcanic springs of the remarkable Furnas valley in São Miguel, its inhabitants and agriculture. He provides an analysis of the waters and describes the house and gardens of Thomas Hickling, the American consul whose father helped to popularize the islands, and which is illustrated with an engraving (p. 66).

In addition to his activities as an explorer and prolific author, Bernardino José de Sena Freitas (1808-1872), a native of Rio de Janeiro, was an official in the Ministry of Marinha e Ultramar. Publicist, historian, contributor to newspapers and journals, he was elected a "sócio provincial" of the Academia Real das Sciencias de Lisboa, and belonged to other learned societies. He inherited from his father properties on the Island of São Miguel, living a considerable time in the Azores.

Written in 1810, this work was published in Pedro de Angelis's important *Colección de obras y documentos relativos a la historia antigua y moderna de las provincias del Río de la Plata,* first printed in 1836-37. Griffin, *Latin America: A Guide to the Historical Literature* 3090 lists the collection, but Palau also lists each item in that collection separately. The somewhat erratic collation matches that of the Bibliothèque nationale de France copy, although our copy has the "Oficios del Gobierno" bound after the title page, rather than after the "Discurso preliminar."

Salinas Grandes is a salt desert in north-central Argentina. Pedro Andres Garcia was sent to take measurements of latitude and longitude near the border and to take notes

about the Indians and their livestock ("sus parcialidades, y acuerdos que han hecho para su conservacion"), and to describe in detail which Indians were friendly to the Spaniards and which were hostile.

First and only Dutch translation of Gerstäcker's recently published *Achtzehn Monate in Süd-Amerika und dessen deutschen Colonien*. The collection, describing the author's eighteen months in South America, includes chapters on Ecuador, Quito, Guayaquil, Peru, the Amazon River, the route from Callao to Valparaiso and from there to Valdivia, Patagonia, Cape Horn, and Uruguay. The lengthy section on Brazil (III, 130-287) mentions Porto Alegre, Rio Grande, Santa Catarina, and Rio de Janeiro.

Gerstäcker (1816-1872), novelist and travel writer, son of a famous opera singer, left his native Germany at age 21 to wander through the United States. Upon his return 6 years later he found that his mother's publication of his New World sketches had made him famous. From 1849 to 1852 Gerstäcker visited North and South America, Polynesia, and Australia. In 1860, with German immigration in mind, he revisited South America, recording his observations in this work, published in 1863. Gerstäcker left 44 volumes of published works that were quite influential: his short story *Germelshausen* was adopted as the plot of the musical *Brigadoon* (1954).

First American edition. On behalf of the Missionary Society, Captain Wilson took a group of missionaries on the *Duff* to the South Seas, where they established a mission in Tahiti in 1796. This volume, although primarily about Captain Wilson, contains substantial information about the victories and setbacks of the missionaries and evaluations of their work by the Missionary Society, relating for the most part to the voyage to establish a mission at Tahiti in 1796-98. A settlement of twenty-five people was formed in Tahiti, but was forced to decamp to Australia due to the civil wars. This volume also includes significant material not in any of the earlier editions (e.g., pp. 141-52, with an account of the conversion of Pomarré, King of Tahiti, and pp. 175-98). Many valuable details about Tahiti, Fiji, Tonga and the Marquesas are included. Captain Wilson's ship put in briefly at Rio de Janeiro in November 1796 (see pp. 123-6), and for slightly longer at Canton (pp. 127-35).

The appendix (pp. 175-219) is headed, "Since the preceding Memoir was compiled, a most wonderful and happy change has been wrought in the state of the mission to the South Sea Islands. The particulars may be gathered by a perusal of the following extracts." Extracts include translations from the king of Tahiti and others.

The first volume is titled Encyclopedia of Exploration to 1800: a comprehensive reference guide to the history and literature of exploration, travel and colonization from the earliest times to the year 1800. It contains 2,327 articles in 1.2 million words, with 4,000 cross-references. There are indexes of ships and persons (7,500 entries), as well as bibliographies (about 20,000 citations).

The second volume is titled Encyclopedia of Exploration, 1800 to 1850: a comprehensive reference guide to the history and literature of exploration, travel and colonization between the years 1800 and 1850. It contains 732 articles in about 700,000 words, with numerous cross-references. There are indexes of ships and persons, as well as bibliographies

The third volume is titled Encyclopedia of Exploration, 1850 to 1940: The Oceans, Islands and Polar Regions. A comprehensive reference guide to the history and literature of exploration, travel and colonization in the oceans, the islands, New Zealand and the polar regions from 1850 to the early decades of the twentieth century. The emphasis is

on the Oceans, Islands and Polar Regions for the final period 1850 to 1940. The present volume contains 521 major articles in well over 700,000 words, with numerous cross-references. There are indexes of ships and persons, as well as bibliographies.

The fourth and penultimate volume is titled *Encyclopedia of Exploration*, 1850 to 1940: *Continental Exploration*. It contains 950 major articles. There are indexes of ships and persons (nearly 4,000 entries), as well as bibliographies (about 16,000 citations).

The fifth and final volume, filling a much needed void, is titled Encyclopedia of Exploration. Invented and Apocryphal Narratives of Travel.

The first four volumes of this highly acclaimed *Encyclopedia* dealt almost exclusively with voyages and travels of indisputable historical reality. In this intriguing final volume the author turns his attention to the curious but compelling alternative literature of exploration; to imaginary, apocryphal and utopian journeys in fabulous lands; and to the abundance of invented, plagiarized and spoof narratives, many of which were accepted in their time as wholly credible but were nothing more than flights of the imagination, blatant deceptions, or monologues of doubtful authenticity.

Pages 15–25 contain a transcription of all text in the manuscript, organized, as is the manuscript itself, chronologically by the years of the fleets. The main text contains color representations of the ships that made up the various fleets, often with the names of the captains. Several of the fleets stopped in Brazil on the outward voyage, beginning with that of Pedro Alvares Cabral in 1500, making this a crucial document for the early history of that country. **82. FIRST and ONLY EDITION. Mariano de Azevedo Itapura (São Paulo, 1864-Rio de Janeiro, 1889), an officer in the coast guard who served on the *Nichteroy*, the *Javary*, and the *Almirante Barrozo*, publishes his unedited letters to his brother. He mentions New Orleans, the Gulf of Mexico, Havana, Matanzas, New York, Newport, the Azores, Madeira, the Canary Islands, Cabo Verde, São Vicente. The last few pages describe a fire aboard an Austrian brig *Cori* in the harbor of Montevideo; for his valor in helping save those aboard, Itapura was commended and promoted. Includes a folding table of holidays for various nations, and a folding plate, in color, of flags for the provinces of Brazil.

The letters that recounted his travels on the Gulf of Mexico and New Orleans had to be reconstructed from the author's notes, since the originals were not available. Itapura had previously published *A batalha naval do Riachuelo*, Rio de Janeiro, 1885.

FIRST EDITION. The work appeared again printed in Dublin, 1789. A "second, corrected" edition appeared in London, 1790, by the same publisher as the present work, with xv, 487; vii, 528 pp. There are as well editions of London, 1793 and London, 1794. The text was also translated into German and published in Leipzig, 1790.

Alexander Jardine (1745-1799), army officer and author, was the illegitimate son of Sir Alexander Jardine, fourth baronet (1712-1790), also an army officer. He eventually rose to the rank of lieutenant colonel, served as counsel in La Coruña from 1779 to 1795, and died in Portugal. Stationed in Gibraltar, in 1771 Jardine was appointed as a representative of the English government to Sultan Mohammed Ibn Abdallah. The letters touch on his time in Morocco (volume I, pp. 1-189), where he visited Tetuan, Larache, Meknes, and traveled into the Atlas Mountains.

The rest of the first volume deals with France, mostly with Paris, and with general observations on the French character, language, literature, the arts, government, education, the military, religion, industry, agriculture, etc. There are brief passages relating to Orleans, Tours, Angoulême, Bordeaux, and some places in between. Jardine's active military career

ended in 1776, when he became a British agent in Spain, gathering intelligence for four years in sometimes dangerous conditions. His time in Spain is dealt with in volume II, pp. 1-400; the principal theme of these pages is Spanish government and society, there is also a defense of sexual equality and advocacy of greater similarity in education and dress between the sexes. He traveled to Fuenterrabía, then from San Sebastián, Vergara, Bilbão, Ribadeo, El Ferrol, Santiago de Compostela to La Coruña. Also visited and commented on are Santander, Cádiz, the Sierra Morena, Cordoba, Aranjuez, El Escorial, and Madrid. Portugal is treated on pp. 401-504 of the second volume, while Jersey is dealt with in the final pages. Having entered Portugal from Galicia, Jardine draws a favorable comparison with Spain. He traveled to Braga and Porto, then went on to Lisbon. As with the other sections, the pages on Portugal deal mainly with the author's observations on just about every possible aspect of Portuguese life.

The Oxford Dictionary of National Biography notes, "[The book's] larger theme is government and society, but it is notable for its defense of sexual equality and advocacy of greater similarity in education and dress between the sexes." The Letters were read by Mary Wollstonecraft, who reviewed the book in the Analytical in 1789. The influence of Jardine's ideas on sexual equality can be seen in Wollstonecraft's Vindication of the Rights of Women, 1792. See Chernock, Men and the Making of Modern British Feminism, p. 21.

FIRST EDITION. In his visit to the Holy Land, Fr. João toured all the major sites in Jerusalem, as well as the Sea of Galilee, Bethlehem, Mt. Zion, and a few other places outside the city. At the end (pp. 233-71) he gives an account of the persecution suffered by the religious orders there since the mid-seventeenth century. Fr. João mentions, for example, an uprising of the people in 1756 when, in order to keep the members of several religious orders safe, the governor of the area had to lock them in the church of the Holy Sepulchre for seven months, where they lived on bread, water and herbs (p. 247). In 1799, when Bonaparte was invading Egypt, about 3,000 Turks attacked a monastery, shouting "Death to the Franks, who are spies for the French" (p. 251). Fr. João argues that it is Portugal's duty to support the religious orders in Palestine, because the Spanish have been seriously weakened by the recent war.

The engraved frontispiece (unsigned) shows scenes from the lives of Christ and the Virgin, the resurrection, and two Franciscans kneeling outside the Holy Sepulchre. The *Viagem* appeared in at least three later editions: Lisbon 1822, 1831 and 1837.



FIRST EDITION. The *Dissertacion* concerns the much debated question of the boundaries between Spanish and Portuguese possessions in South America. The authors discuss Pope Alexander VI's papal bull of 1493 and the Treaty of Tordesillas, 1494, which set the original limits of expansion, and then discuss more recent negotiations that had resulted in a provisional treaty. (The boundaries were definitively set in 1750, by the Treaty of Madrid.) The final part of the work is concerned with early discoveries in South



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America, and includes a long section devoted to the discovery and occupation of the Amazon Basin by the Portuguese (pp. 119-73).

Jorge Juan (1713-1773) and Antonio Ulloa (1716-1795), Spanish naval officers with diverse political, scientific and even book collecting interests, are best known for their *Relacion historica del viage a la America Meridional* Madrid, 1748, the most widely read account of the expedition dispatched under the auspices of the French Academy of Sciences to measure an arc of the meridian at the Equator.



Written as a series of letters to his wife, the *Cinco annos de emigração* describes the author's travels to England (Falmouth, Plymouth, Exeter, Windsor, Bath, and Bristol; London, pp. 33-90 and pp. 300-428), Belgium (Brussels, Bruges, Waterloo), and France (Paris, pp. 99-244). As one might expect of a military engineer, he is particularly interested in arsenals, mines, hospitals, transportation, gas lighting, public health, etc.

Antonio Bernardino Pereira do Lago (Torres Novas, date unknown-Lisbon 1847) was a military engineer and a member of the Commissão de Liquidição da Divida aos Militares, created in 1834. Edouard René Lefèbvre de Laboulaye (1811-1883) is best remembered as the man who in 1865 proposed what became the Statue of Liberty, executed by his friend Frédéric Auguste Bartholdi. Laboulaye, a lawyer, abolitionist, and poet, was a great admirer of the United States; he wrote a three-volume work on its political history that was published in 1855-1866, under the repressive Napoleon III.

Nunes do Liam (ca. 1530-1608), a native of Évora, was a historian, philologist, geographer and jurisconsult, and is recognized as one of Portugal's greatest writers. His *Orthographia da lingua portuguesa*, Lisbon 1576 and *Origem da lingua portuguesa*, Lisbon 1606, are valuable treatises on the Portuguese language; his summary of Portuguese laws, published in 1560 and 1569, is a legal landmark.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION. The eulogy of the Infante D. Pedro Carlos (1786-1812) begins on p. 8, and includes mention of his activities as admiral on the voyage of the royal family to Brazil in 1807, as well as his participation in the Academia Real das Sciencias.

D. Pedro Carlos was a grandson of D. Carlos III of Spain, and the only surviving child of the Infante D. Gabriel de Bourbon. His mother was the Portuguese Infanta D. Maria Ana Vitória Josefa de Bragança (1768-1788), eldest daughter of D. Pedro III and D. Maria I. In 1810 in Rio de Janeiro, he married D. Maria Teresa de Bragança, daughter of the Prince Regent D. João, the future D. João VI of Portugal, and his wife the Infanta D. Carlota Joaquina de Bourbon, daughter of D. Carlos IV of Spain. Their only child, D. Sebastião Gabriel de Bourbon e Bragança, played a significant role in the Carlist Wars.

P. João Silverio de Lima (Lisbon, 1751-1829) joined the Franciscan order in 1771, but by 1782 he was a secular presbyter teaching rational and moral philosophy and prior of

S. Julião in Santarém. He was also a member of the Academia Real das Sciencias, at one of whose sessions he delivered this eulogy.

This book was the first guide to shell collecting, with some of the earliest direct references to collecting shells in New Holland and the South Seas. Mawe's charming, rare guide to shell collecting was first published in 1804, without illustrations; only one surviving example of the first edition is known. The second edition is completely unrecorded. The third edition of 1821, with two color plates, is less rare, as is this fourth edition, enhanced by the two exquisite plates engraved by John Mawe. According to Stilwell, these were colored by Mawe's wife, Sarah. The illustrations depict shells and fauna found in the far reaches of the world, including the South Seas, with shells of the

Sandwich Islands (Hawaii), the Marquesas and Society Islands, Tahiti and New Zealand all discussed in the text.

The collecting of shells in New Holland is discussed on three pages: "Van Diemen's Land offers a vast field to the naturalist, particularly to the conchologist, zoologist and entomologist, who would be amply remunerated for whatever they might collect ... "; there is further mention of rare shells found by two boys on a whaling ship in Western Port.

Mawe (1764–1829), who spent many of his early years at sea, collected minerals in England for the King of Spain in the late eighteenth century. When war broke out between England and Spain in 1804, he was detained at Cadiz and then again at Montevideo. Only after Beresford captured Montevideo was he released. Soon after, he began a journey to Rio de Janeiro and then into Minas Geraes, which lasted two and a half years. After his return to England in 1811, he published *Travels in the Interior of Brazil, particularly in the Gold and Diamond Districts of that Country, by Authority of the Prince Regent of Portugal, including a Voyage to the Rio de la Plata, and an Historical Sketch of the Revolution of Buenos Ayres (1812). Mawe opened a shop in the Strand and wrote books on mineralogy.*

Provenance: Joaquim de Sousa-Leão, distinguished Brazilian historian and diplomat of Portuguese ancestry, was a significant book and art collector. Records the expenses incurred by D. José de Menezes during his trip to Vienna in 1743 to marry D. Luiza Gonzaga, Countess of Rappach. Travel expenses are listed as well as expenditures for a portrait of himself and (among other items) for diamonds, furniture, cloth, tailors, silverware, plates and chocolate. The entries vary in quality; some include names of sellers. The sellers are more likely agents and middlemen than the actual purveyors of the products; on p. 8 are mentioned Avram and David Fernandes Nunes in Holland, almost surely exiled Portuguese Jews. A David Fernandes Nunes is mentioned as an Amsterdam banker in documents cited by Biblioteca Nacional de Lisboa, *Inventário: secção XIII, manuscriptos,* as is an Aron Fernandes Nunes. The present document is signed at the end by D. Diogo de Menezes y Tavora and Francisco de Mello.

The Menezes family had close ties with Austria. D. José's father, D. Diogo de Menezes e Tavora (Morgado de Valada na Ordem de Cristo, Alcaide-mor de Silves, Vedor da Casa da Rainha D. Maria Ana and her Estribeiro-mor) married an Austrian lady-in-waiting of D. João V's queen, D. Maria Anna of Austria. D. José was the second child and eldest son, born in 1713. When he returned to Portugal after his wedding, his wife became a lady-in-waiting to the queen.

With the latter he collaborated on *O mysterio da estrada de Cintra*, 1871, and founded *As farpas*, in which the two satirized the foibles and follies of life in Lisbon. (After the first 15 issues, which appeared in 1872, the journal was written and published by Ramalho Ortigão alone for more than a decade.) Ramalho Ortigão is also known for his descriptions of his travels, such as *A Hollanda*, 1883: "A vivid, witty and charming account of Holland, with malicious side-reflections on Portugal" (Bell, *Portuguese Literature* p. 322).

Pascual, a member of the secretariat of the Brazilian Ministry of Foreign Affairs, provides Portuguese translations of the letters, then comments on contradictions and inadequacies, which Pascual believed occurred because Mansfield did not take sufficient time to observe Brazil.

A native of New Castile, Pascual studied in Spain, Italy, France and Germany before settling in Rio de Janeiro in 1852, where he became a naturalized Brazilian citizen. His four-volume *Apuntes para la historia de la república oriental del Uruguay* appeared in Paris, 1863.

Provenance: Sergio Teixeira de Macedo (Rio de Janeiro, 1809-Paris, 1867), a politician and diplomat, represented Brazil in Lisbon, Rome, Turin, Vienna, Paris, the United States, and London. He was studying law at the University of Coimbra, but due to the political upheavals in 1828, completed his degree in Olinda.He was later a member of the emperor's council, *grão-cruz* of the Orden Imperial and the Orden da Rosa in Brazil and the Ordem de Christo in Portugal, *commendador* of St. Maurice and St. Lazarus in Sardinia, and of St. George in Parma. Sebastião to Popes Pius IV, Pius V, and Gregory XIII, and various other orations by the diplomat, poet, and philologist Aquiles Estaço, including copious notes, bibliography, and commentary. Aquiles Estaço, or Achilles Statius, was born in Vidigueira in 1524. He was taken from Portugal to India as a young man, but soon returned to Portugal to study at the Universidade de Évora with André de Resende. In 1555 he went to Rome where he first became secretary of the Council of Trent by Pius IV, then secretary of Latin letters that were written to princes by Pius V, and secretary to Gregory XIII. He died in Rome in 1581.

The purpose of the voyage—to negotiate a trade treaty—is described here with detailed accounts of Japanese customs and dress, politics, industry and geography. The second section of the work is a history of Luso-Japanese relations with references to Fernão Mendes Pinto, Diogo do Couto, the American Francis Hawks, and others. Like the United States, Portugal wanted to see Japan opened up to foreign trade. With the success of Perry in 1853, other countries began to send diplomatic missions to Japan, and Portugal was one of the first to do so.

Marques Pereira, son of the diplomat Antonio Feliciano Marques Pereira, was a naval superintendent in Goa and a lieutenant captain in the National Armada.

Lisbon. **Caution**: due to the fact that the first leaf of this copy is in deplorable condition, and the second leaf is lacking, these two leaves were reproduced from another copy, in the possession of the Comissão Nacional para as Comemorações dos Descobrimentos Portugueses. The CNCDP copy is the first issue, in which, on the verso of the second leaf, it is stated in error that Fernão Mendes Pinto was a native of Almada. (In the second issue, a cancel leaf was substituted, correctly stating that he was born in Monte-mor-o-Velho.) His 21-year odyssey carried him to China, Tartary, Pegu, India, Ethiopia, Ormuz and points between. He reached Japan in 1542, and claims to have been in the first party of Europeans to land there. He may be the first to have described the Dalai Lama, the wild beasts of Asia's equatorial forests, and the horrendous Juggernaut festival.

"His important description of Venezuela ... was immediately translated into English and studied on both sides of the Atlantic" (Howgego). It was included in Sir Richard Phillip's *A Collection of Modern and Contemporary Voyages and Travels*, London, 1805-10 (part 2, 1806). The edition published in New York, 1806, was translated in part by Washington Irving.

According to McNeil and Deas, de Pons was one of Humboldt's earliest followers, and his description of the country "is similar to Humboldt's essay on New Spain, which was not to appear for another five years: he analyses the colony systematically, describing its history, geography, population and commercial possibilities. And like Humboldt he was most impressed with the natural resources of South America—'the new promised land' as he calls it." Hill notes (on the New York edition), "This is an important account of Venezuela giving a description of the country and people and also accounts of the growth and production of cocoa, indigo, sugar, cotton, coffee, and tobacco." Aside from descriptions of major towns and cities (Caracas, Maracaibo, etc.), topics include: geography, climate, pearl fisheries, salt, medicinal plants, education, siesta, marriage, Creoles, slavery, exposure of newborns, Indians, government, judiciary, military, navy, trade, the Inquisition, Guiana, and the Orinoco River.



'O animal mais horrendo he o Jacareo,' he states, writing also about the 'onça,' the snakes, the 'surucuré,' etc. The author declares that this account was written with the intention of publicizing these regions which he considers to be a paradise. ... a second part was never published." A number of authorities have commented on the rarity of this pamphlet. We speculate that one reason for this rarity, in addition to the ephemeral nature of the piece and its interest, may be the policy of the Portuguese court to suppress all such glowing accounts about Brazil throughout the colonial period. This also may also be the reason the second part never saw the light of day.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION of this eyewitness description of two royal marriagesby-proxy at the palace of Vila Viçosa in April 1785, and the celebrations that followed. With the aim of mending the strained relations between Spain and Portugal, the Infanta of Spain D. Carlota Joaquina was wed to the Infante D. João (the future D. João VI), and the Infanta of Portugal, D. Mariana Victória, was wed to the Infante D. Gabriel of Spain.

This account is mostly concerned with D. Mariana Victória's trip to Spain, which the author seems to have witnessed. The departure did not go smoothly: it was delayed due to flooding, and the regiments assigned to escort her arrived late. As she passed from Badajoz to Merida, Oropesa, Talavera de la Reina, Toledo, and finally Aranjuez, she was greeted with acclamations and spectacles arranged for her amusement. At Aranjuez, the marriage was solemnized with the Patriarch of the Indies presiding.

The Infanta of Portugal D. Mariana Victoria (b. 1768) was the eldest surviving daughter of D. Maria I and D. Pedro III of Portugal. In 1788 D. Gabriel, D. Mariana Victoria (age 19), and their only surviving child all succumbed to smallpox at El Escorial.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION of this rare account of a naval battle in the Bay of Biscay during the Seven Years' War. The *Duc d'Aquitaine* had stopped at Lisbon on her way

home from India. On the final leg of her journey home she met two English ships in the Bay of Biscay and was forced to surrender. This account briefly describes the two-hour action and the number of dead and wounded on each side.

The Seven Years' War, 1756-1763, was waged in Europe, North America (where it began in 1754, and is known as the French and Indian War), Central and South America, West Africa, India (the Third Carnatic War), and the Philippines. Prussia, Great Britain, and (from 1761) Portugal were allied against France, Austria, Spain (from 1761), Russia (until 1762), Sweden (1757-1762), Saxony, and the Mughal Empire (from 1757). Aside from venting the ongoing antagonism amongst the Bourbons, Habsburgs, and Hohenzollerns, the countries were battling for overseas colonies and commercial superiority. As a result of the war, Great Britain annexed Canada, much North American territory west of the Alleghenies, and Florida, and became dominant in the Indian subcontinent. France transferred Louisiana to Spain. Prussia gained influence at the expense of the Holy Roman Empire, which is often considered to be the starting point for the rise of the modern German state. Removal of the French threat to the thirteen North American Colonies, and British attempts to obtain revenues from these colonies to compensate for wartime expenditures were major factors in the movement for Independence culminating in the American Revolution.



Joaquim Heliodoro da Cunha Rivara (Arrayollos, 1809-1879) arrived in India as secretary-general in 1855, having spent fifteen years as head of the Biblioteca de Évora and established himself as a writer by frequent contributions to *Panorama*, edited by Alexandre Herculano. During his tenure as secretary-general, which lasted until 1872, Cunha Rivara produced important philological studies of the Concani language and



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published many documents of vital importance for the history of Portuguese India. Perhaps more importantly, his research stimulated others, such as Felippe Nery Xavier.

In addition to his role as public servant, Cunha Rivara was also a founding member of the Instituto Vasco da Gama. A prolific writer of many interests, he published works on linguistics, history, and politics and was a regular contributor to *Panorama, Revista Litteraria,* and *Boletim do Governo da India,* and he was editor of the monthly *Chronista de Tissuary* from 1866 to 1869. He also published a catalogue of the manuscripts held in the library at Évora.




FIRST EDITION; a second was printed by Ibarra's daughter in 1808. The Prologo (7 ll.) offers a short history of Portugal, notes on its geography, and a brief dicussion of available maps. Each of the six chapters includes an introduction on the history of the region and its major points of interest, followed by distances between towns. They are Entre Minho e Douro, Tras-os-montes, Beira, Estremadura, Alentejo, and Algarve. The section's title is printed vertically outside the double borders of the page. Information is also given for Spanish cities and towns near the frontier with Portugal. One of the intended uses for this book was to aid in sending correspondence and perhaps shipments of goods by post.

The work is dedicated to Ricardo Wall (Richard Wall, 1694-1777), son of Irish Jacobite refugees living in Nantes, who entered Spanish naval service in 1716 and rose to the rank of field marshal by 1744. After being wounded he turned to a diplomatic career, serving as ambassador to the Court of St. James and then foreign minister under Fernando VI and Carlos III.


Pedro Rodriguez Campomanes (1723-1803), Conde de Campomanes, "probably influenced Spanish economic thought of his time more than any other writer" (La Force, p. 156). There is little information concerning his biography. Even though one branch of his family were hidalgos, they were not wealthy. He rose by force of his brilliance, revealed at an early age, and staunch character. The author's contemporary Sempere y Guarinos praised the *Discurso accerca do modo de fomentar a industria do povo* highly: "Apenas se encontrará obra alguna, que en tan corto volumen comprenda tanto numero de principios y máximas, las mas importantes para el adelantamiento de la industria nacional, y de la felicidad pública" (II, 80). Campomanes advocated household industry—mainly textiles—so that people would not have to move from small towns and farms. In order to spread the knowledge that would make such industry possible, he strongly advocated the formation of local economic societies. When the *Discurso* was first printed in Madrid, 1774, the King ordered copies sent to all local governing officials and bodies of Spain, and to bishops for distribution among the clergy.

The Conde de Campomanes was a leading minister of D. Carlos III; hence his economic philosophy, of the liberal, mercantilist school, had an enormous impact on Spain's economy. Among his reforms were free trade with America, tax exemptions for many raw materials, duties on more imports, and the creation of a national bank. Campomanes also wrote on a wide range of political, legal and historical matters. His achievements were widely recognized abroad: for instance, Benjamin Franklin welcomed him as a member of the American Philosophical Society merely on the basis of what had been printed about him in newspapers. He was created Conde de Campomanes in 1780.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION. The author's intent was to give an overview of the customs, industry, laws, agriculture, commerce and mines, and other products of Portugal. At the same time, his book is a guide to any future traveler. The work is divided into three parts. The first part briefly (pp. 1-44) treats in general the theme of Portugal's riches in relation to other nations, both present and past, with references to a number of contemporary and past authors. On pp. 23-25 are a number of references to specific products, such as lead, lithium, indigo, magnesium, cinnamon, from Brazil, Angola, São

Tomé, and Cabo Verde. Pará (mentioned three times), Bahia, Rio de Janeiro and Maranhão are specifically named, in addition to Brazil in general, which is named twelve times. The Islands of São Miguel and Terceira in the Azores are also mentioned, as are plants specific to Brazil.

The second part (pp. 45-162) spells out the qualities needed by the traveler and guidelines for obtaining knowledge of the agriculture, commerce, letters and arms of the country, as well as the animal, vegetable and mineral resources.

Part three (pp. 163-97) deals with the preparation and sending of natural specimens to the National Museum. It contains instructions for various divisions of the animal kingdom, including quadrupeds of various sizes, birds, eggs, nests, amphibians, reptiles (with a separate section on snakes), "nantes", fish, insects, mollusks, conches, starfish, coral, etc., crustaceans, as well as plants and minerals. Pages 199-211 contain supplementary advice to the potential traveler, including which instruments to take, tips on political observation, conversation, diaries, etc. A final section of additions concentrates on the author's native Tras-os-Montes, devoting considerable attention to the silk factory near Bragança and its products. Montezinho, Lugar de França, and the Villa de Chacim are also discussed.

The two large folding tables are to be completed by the future traveler.

The author was a native of Bragança. He served as *juiz de fóra* at the villa de Moncorva, and *desembargador da Relação do Porto*. Later he served in various high administrative posts in Lisbon, where he died in 1819. He was one of the earliest members of the Academia Real das Sciencias de Lisboa.

First edition of the complete work in French; Innocêncio states that a shorter version was printed in the *Bulletin* of the Société de Géographie in 1836. Borba de Moraes writes, "When Navarrete was preparing his famous *Colección de los viages*, he wrote to Santarem asking for information about Vespucci's voyage which was financed by Portugal. Santarem replied in a letter which Navarrete published in his *Viages* in Spanish [1825]. It was translated into French and read by the author at a session of the Société de Géographie de Paris in October, 1835. It is printed here together with several other articles on the same subject read to the Society in previous years. Santarem was the first historian to research into the Portuguese sources concerning Vespucci and to note the silence of contemporary Portuguese authors. He commented that Vespucci did not command any expedition financed by Portugal and denies him any merit. In fact, Santarem's attacks were so violent that Fiske (*Discovery of America*) considers them to be a curious example of morbid psychology." The *Recherches* are copiously annotated and indexed. An English translation appeared in Boston, 1850.

The second Visconde de Santarem (1791-1856) has been called "the greatest figure in the history of Portuguese cartography" (Cortesão, *History of Portuguese Cartography* I, 23); in fact, it was Santarem who coined the term "cartographia." He travelled to Brazil with the royal family in 1807 and held various diplomatic posts; he also served as Keeper of the Royal Archives at Torre do Tombo from 1824 until 1833, when he was dismissed for political reasons. Although he spent the rest of his life in Paris, his standing with the Portuguese government later improved to the point that the government funded many of his publications, and appointed him Keeper of the Torre do Tombo without requiring him to return to Portugal.

FIRST EDITION; a second appeared in 1786. This is the first literary voyage in Egypt, predating by many years those of Chateaubriand, Lamartine and Flaubert. Savary, a fluent Arabic speaker, had read many little-known Arabic sources on Egypt. Here (in the form of a series of letters) he offers vividly described details on government, commerce, agriculture, religion, daily life, and ancient and modern architecture. Savary visited Alexandria, Rosetta, Damietta (where Louis IX, King of France, landed on the Seventh Crusade), and elsewhere. The maps show the harbor of Alexandria, the Nile Delta, and

Egypt as far south as Aswan. The diagram is a cross-section of the Great Pyramid. The English translation ran to at least three editions; it was also translated to German.

Claude-Etienne Savary (1750-1788) was a pioneer of Egyptology who also translated the Koran, largely while traveling in Egypt. His textbook on Arabic was published posthumously as *Grammaire de la langue Arabe vulgaire et littérale*, Paris, 1813.







First separate edition. D'Avezac had criticized Varnhagen's *Historia* on several grounds, especially Varnhagen's interpretations of Vespucci's voyages. 

ORIGINAL EDITION of one of the narratives that later comprised the *História trágico-marítima*; extremely rare. As with all of these Portuguese shipwreck accounts from the mid-sixteenth to the mid-seventeenth century, it was later produced in a counterfeit eighteenth-century edition. Boxer noted, "I have never seen a copy of this first edition and have taken the description from the *História da literatura portuguesa ilustrada*, III, 214" ("An Introduction to the *História trágico-marítima*," in *Miscelânea de estudos em honra do Prof. Hernani Cidade*, p. 86, no. 17A). In some corrections and clarifications to his previous article, Boxer refers to a copy in the Torre do Tombo, gives the collation (which agrees with ours) and calls it "excessively rare" (*Quaderni portoghesi* V [Pisa 1979], 107). Innocêncio and Figanière also knew only of the Torre do Tombo copy. The Visconde de Azevedo, mistaking the counterfeit edition for the original, reprinted the former on his private press in a limited edition of four copies at Porto in 1865.

The Portuguese vessels *Sacramento* and *Nossa Senhora de Atalaya* set sail from Goa together in February 1647. Neither was in good repair, and both were wrecked off the coast of Natal, 30 June and 4 July 1647. Each ship's survivors were unaware of the other's misfortune until the company from the *Sacramento* discovered the wreckage of *Nossa Senhora de Atalaya*. They finally caught up with their countrymen and together continued the arduous overland march toward Moçambique. Of 72 persons who reached shore after the wreck of the *Sacramento*, only five Portuguese and four slaves lived through the rigors of the journey. Authorities in Sofala held the survivors incommunicado for a month while investigating the whereabouts of jewels salvaged from both ships.

News of the loss of the ships took a long time to reach Lisbon: the first notice was apparently received in August 1649. Further details were supplied by Bento Teixeira Feo (or Feio, or Feyo), a treasury official in India who later served as *thesoureiro-môr* in Lisbon. He had been aboard *Nossa Senhora de Atalaya*, and after being interviewed by the Overseas Councilors began to write this report of the shipwreck at the King's command. Teixeira Feo's moving narrative gives details of the shipwrecks and the dangers the survivors underwent as they made their way north. It is rich in description of the terrain, animals, vegetation, and the indigenous population, which makes it not only an affecting piece of literature, but a crucial source for the ethno-history of Southeast Africa.

Includes a preface by the editor, a brief "Témoignoage" by José-Augusto França, 16 essays (11 in Portuguese, 4 in French, and 1 in English), as well as a "Bibliographie des travaux de Jean Aubin" by Françoise Aubin (pp. 609-18) and "Bibliographie des travaux de Denys Lombard" by Claudine Salmon (pp. 619-42). The editor also provides by far the longest contribution, "O malogrado estabelecimento oficial dos Portugueses em Sunda" (pp. 381-608).

The subtitle of this work, which appears on p. [3], is *Viagens no interior da Ilha de San-Miguel*. According to Innocêncio a second part appeared in 1854 with the subtitle *Bento de Goes — pequenos quadras romanticos*, with 46 pp.

Torres (1827-1874), a native of Ponta Delgada, held a number of government positions from and early age. He also began a concurrent career as a journalist and literary figure in 1843 with articles in *Açoriano oriental*. In 1844 he helped found and directed *Philologo*, the literary journal of the Sociedade Escholastica-michaelense, of which were published 12 numbers, going on over the years to write for many other newspapers and reviews.

FIRST EDITION of this "philosophical travelogue" which stands as one of Unamuno's "most influential books" (Ward). A second edition appeared in Madrid, 1930, and a third in Buenos Aires, 1941. In a series of interconnected essays written from 1906 to 1909, based on his journeys through the Iberian Peninsula, Unamuno reflects on literature, history, politics and thought. Chapter headings include contemporary Portuguese literature and specific writers (e.g., Eugénio de Castro, Teixeira de Pascoaes, Guerra Junqueiro and Eça de Queirós), plus specific towns (Aveiro, Braga, Guarda, and Alcobaça). In Spain, he comments on Barcelona, Guadalupe, Yuste, Avila de los Caballeros, Aitzgorria, Galicia and Trujillo, as well as Gran Canaria and Tenerife.

Miguel de Unamuno y Jugo (Bilbao, 1846-Salamanca, 1936), philosopher, essayist novelist, poet, and playwright, is one of the leading figures in Spanish literature of the twentieth century. He was also a Lusophile—probably the leading Spanish connoisseur in his time of Portuguese literature, culture, and history.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION of this political fable on Iberian union, written in the form of descriptions and historical comments on a journey from Paris to Madrid, with visits to several noble families. There are references to Dumas and Almeida Garrett, on whose *Viagens na minha terra*, 1846, this work was modeled. It is among the dozen of Vasconcellos' "obras principais" listed in the *Dicionário cronológico*.

António Augusto Teixeira de Vasconcellos (Porto, 1816-Paris, 1878) was a prolific novelist, journalist, politician and diplomat. A Miguelista and captain of militia early in life, he studied law at the University of Coimbra (1844), and soon went to Luanda, where his political views eventually made him unwelcome, and he was forced to return to Lisbon. He also ended up persona non grata after a four-year sojourn in Paris. Vasconcellos was vice-president of the Academia de Ciências de Lisboa and one of the founders of the Sociedade de Geografia de Lisboa, a deputy to the Cortes from 1865 to 1878, ambassador to the United States, etc.

Second edition of a work first published in Lisbon, 1608. There are also editions of 1803, 1924, 1974, 1999, and an electronic reproduction of 2005. A doctrinal work written in dialogue form, Renaissance style, this book attempts to deal with political and economic problems stemming from Portuguese expansion, which had been aggravated by the Spanish administration. According to António Salgado Júnior, in Jacinto do Prado Coelho, *Dicionário de literatura* (4th ed., 1994), I, 271-2, it is the first important monument of Portuguese economic thought. The three interlocutors, a political figure, a philosopher, and a soldier, were identified by Barbosa Machado as representing, respectively, the Conde de Castanheira, minister of D. João III and grandfather of the author, D. Jerónimo Osório, and Martim Afonso de Sousa, governor of India. The position and qualities of Lisbon are described in a way to attempt to convince the Spanish King, who was also King of Portugal, to move the capital of his empire from Madrid to Lisbon. The index contains references to Brazil and São Thomé, as well as quite a few to India.

Luis Mendes de Vasconcellos (Évora ca. 1542-Valletta 1623) was colonial Governor of Angola (1617-1621) and the 55th Grand Master of the Order of Malta (1622-1623). In addition to the present work, he wrote an *Arte militar*, published in 1612.


